


THE B.C.A. PRAYER



OFF TO LAUNCESTON



On a December day two years ago I answered the Wattle Park vicarage telephone in Melbourne and heard the familiar voice of the Rev. Tom Morgan of B.C.A. Council. He asked if we would consider going to Exmouth. My wife Madge and I went to an atlas to find out where Exmouth is and to the Lord to ask Him whether this was His call to us. It was.

Now with this assignment almost finished we can only thank Him for the privilege of living and working here. We have certainly tried to give our best in this often hot and isolated area.

The distances here must be experienced to be believed. Our branch church is at Onslow, 400 km away and we go there once a month, giving thanks, as always, for the airconditioner in the car.

We have to serve and give to the Lord and the people here but what we receive is so much more, as so many people have given us friendship and support.

We have just farewelled one of our most staunch supporters in Lieut.-Commander John Wood of the U.S. Navy, at the Exmouth facility, who has been my Warden for over a year but who has now left to go back to the United States with his family.

We have received the joy of preaching the Gospel, sharing in Bible studies, teaching religious instruction in schools, visiting homes and hospitals and families on the outlying sheep stations.

Exmouth is a special town, free from industrial and racial strife, where Americans and Australians live side-by-side and mix in work, sport, worship and in friendship.

The American Chaplain and I work in close co-operation and support each other, while the Assembly of God Pastor, the Chaplain and I meet regularly for prayer.

In Onslow there are about 100 Europeans and 200 Aboriginals. Amongst the Aboriginals we see something of the demoralising frustration of a people who are given a good deal of money but have neither the incentive nor the opportunity to work and thus succumb very easily to the temptation of drink.

Madge and I have visited practically all the homes in this town, and we are very happy that the Aboriginal children are starting to come to Sunday School. The day-to-day ministry to the Aboriginals in the town is carried on by a fine Church of Christ couple resident there.

There are many compensations in living in a place like Exmouth, and I don't just mean the absence of smog. Although we miss the strength of meeting large numbers of Christians we do feel the benefit of belonging to the large B.C.A. family and being upheld by the prayers of so many who know that prayer does really change things.

Ignorance of the gift of God in Jesus Christ our Lord is not restricted to people overseas but is just as real in the outback pastoral areas and the "instant" isolated more ways than one.

The Bush Church Aid Society exists to serve the Church of God in the outback of our great country in meeting this need. Missionary concern, like charity, must begin at home, but it is tragic if it ends there.

MISSIONERS

Clergy are recruited and supported by B.C.A. for pastoral and evangelistic work in areas which differ considerably from the hot far north to the cold far south of our continent - from Alyangula on Trans-Australian Railway Line in Groote Eylandt in the Northern Territory to Zeehan in Tasmania. SPECIALIST WORKERS

The Society has responded to particular needs in outback areas by providing specialised workers for specific tasks. A Diocesan Administrator, Mr. Stan Hummerston, is fully supported by the Society as he works in the Diocese of North West Australia assisting the Bishop in diocesan life.

At Nungalinya College in Darwin (a college established by the Anglican and Uniting Church of the Northern Territory to train Aboriginal Christian leaders) the Society supplies support for a librarian and a clerical worker.

THE MINING BOOM

With the increasing importance of Australia's mineral wealth the establishment of large numbers of modern, but isolated mining towns throughout the outback and the spiritual ministry. Tarcoola, now the consequent increase of a transient and unstable population, it is vital that the Anglican Church maintains an effective, consistent and high calibre witness and ministry in these places. The Society is presently inof these mining towns such as Newman in North West Australia and Alyangula, Northern Territory, to name but a few. The bulk of B.C.A. work is in mining towns.





MORE PRECIOUS THAN DIAMONDS

In our five years in the East Kimberley we have seen the mood of our community change from the disillusionment after the failure of the cotton and the frustration during the search for a suitable alternative, to the very buoyant feeling of expectation as gold is once more mined around Hall's Creek, diamonds are found very close to Kununurra and very high yields are harvested on the pilot sugar farm.

Many people, not without cause, are hopeful that the mining, the ever increasing flow of tourists and the promise of the best sugar yields in Australia, will be the salvation of Kununurra.

People come to the Kimberley to find "that something" — they come to this last outpost in search of meaning — or in the hope of getting a break — or of striking it rich.

Some come and find Christ!

Roger, a farmer, and Marion with son lan and Lynda leave Geraldton on a pilgrimage to find meaning in life. As they travel north they are ministered to by a number of clergy of the Diocese and end up staying in Kununurra, the end of the line. After their 2,000 mile journey they accept Christ as Lord and Saviour. Marion and lan are confirmed — and so one journey ends as their new journey in Christ begins.

David, a Government scientist, shares at our evangelistic night that he and his family came, not because of a job transfer, but

because of what God wanted to do in their lives.

Joan, mother of two, finds Christ as she kneels on her loungeroom floor after 40 years of attending Church and has not stopped growing since.

Kylie, also mother of two, surrenders her life to Christ after being in Kununurra about 12 months and is now keenly involved in the Parish newspaper and is Church Secretary.

People come and go from Kununurra in an endless stream still in search for that something, but some go from Kununurra to "go on" with God.

Angus, Anne and family left to go to Ridley College, Melbourne. Angus is to be ordained priest on the 3rd February 1982 by our new Bishop and then minister in this Diocese.

Mike and Lynne left also to go to Ridley and Mike will finish his first year in college this year.

Shirley was a shy, quiet girl — but not after living at the Rectory this last year and is also applying to go to Ridley in 1982.

Not all of the Kununurra Church is at Ridley, but a number have gone away blessed by being involved in a community of believers, a Body of Christ, a Church. A Church that would not be here if it were not for people who cared for the bush. People like you who are reading this article, who have shared in the vision of B.C.A. and supported its work. Without your care and concern there would not have been a Rectory, a car, or a Rector to bring the ministry of word and sacrament.

Over the years the people of Kununurra have been so encouraged by your help and sacrifice that they have shared in the sacrifice with you. In our last financial year the 20 or so adults who worship each Sunday raised a total of \$21,000 to renovate the Rectory and provide the costs of travel to a Parish some 250,000 sq. km (an area about half to two-thirds the size of the State of Victoria). This year we are well on the way to our budget of \$17,000.

By the time you read this, Sue and I and our three children will have left Kununurra after nearly five years. We cannot say how much we thank you for your support and Praise God for you. Support in prayer, financially and in care and interest. It has been of great blessing to be part of the family of B.C.A.
