# A POWERFUL PREACHER



In 1970, the B.C.A. Missioner at Leigh Creek, Brian Carter baptised Bruce and his wife and encouraged him to travel and preach on his visits to the Pitjantjatjara and Yankunytjatjara communities. Bruce has continued to receive valued assistance from B.C.A. Missioners and one year with the aid of the B.C.A. Missioner at Coober pedy, he sold enough old clothes to hire a bus to take 35 Yunkatutjaras to the Christian Convention at Port Augusta.

## "MY LAND

Recently a full-blood Aborigine from the Wonkamurra tribe near Bourke, Western N.S.W., named Mungindi (his legal name was George Harrison), died at the age of 107 years.


Mungindi, when asked at one time what he thought of land rights, replied, "What land rights? God owns all the land. My land rights are in heaven."

Many years before, Mungindi had come in to Bourke on a drinking spree, but instead of getting drunk, he became filled with the Spirit of God at a church meeting. He became a tireless worker for the Lord Jesus and was a noted voice at Christian Conventions and a foundation member of the United Aborigines Mission Church at Bourke.

Mungindi's story is like that of John the Baptist, preparing the way for an exciting movement of the Spirit of God amongst Aborigines throughout Australia's outback.

Reports from B.C.A.'s Missioners, news clippings in many Christian Newspapers and a special TV report on Channel 9's "60 Minutes", has helped to portray something of the amazing revival occurring amongst Aborigines. Whole Aboriginal communities have become Christian (e.g. Warburton); 2,000 Aborigines met for a Christian Convention (e.g. Mt. Margaret).

# **RIGHTS ARE IN HEAVEN"**



Hotels are facing bankruptcy because Aborigines have stopped drinking (one North West hotel even offered free beer to try and entice drinkers back); teams of Aboriginal Christians visiting other Aboriginal communities to preach Jesus (the Elcho Islanders to Weipa). John and Joy Sandefur, of Wycliffe Bible Translators, reporting on the Kimberleys Aborigine revival, said in "New Life":

"If our impressions are true to what is taking place in The Kimberleys, then we are encouraged to believe that this awakening is different to anything experienced before."

The Reverend Tony Nicholls. Principal of Nungalinya College, Darwin, writes . . . "Most of the Church and community leaders who attend our courses have been touched by this renewal movement. We thank God for many changed lives, but there is a concern lest it all degenerate into syncretistic spiritism or become an escapist "trip" for peoples exposed to immense social pressures. More solid Biblical input is crucial if the renewal is to produce congregations that are truly Aboriginal and Christian. My own personal conviction is that there will be no strong Aboriginal Christianity without more attention to the translation and study of the Old Testament (especially Genesis and Exodus).

As one talks with Aboriginal Church leaders and Bible translators, it becomes clear that the Old Testament is of great interest to Aboriginals. They want to know about the Beginnings. They identify with patriarchal wanderings, sacred sites (e.g. Bethel), the Land, the Law, the Ceremonies. They appreciate the concreteness of the Old Testament and its great stories. They can often relate it to their own 'Dreaming'. It is their way to Jesus as it was for the first disciples."

## **WAKELY WRITES.**

Dear Friends,

The first Aboriginal man I knew well was Harry Huddleston. Harry worked as a diver on the construction of the Warragamba Dam when I was Chaplain there in the 'fifties. Harry came originally from the Northern Territory, having been evacuated during the war from Groote Island, and accommodated in the old Rectory at Mulgoa.

Harry and his wife were fine Christian leaders in the Church and respected by the whole Warragamba community. He was also a courageous diver. During the building of the coffer dams to divert the water in the Warragamba Gorge so the main wall of the dam could be constructed, Harry was responsible for saving the lives of several men working with him on that dangerous job. It was significant that Harry was accorded the honour of assisting the Premier of N.S.W. at the official opening of the dam.

It was my privilege in June of this year whilst I was visiting Weipa, to meet an Evangelistic team of Aboriginal people from Galiwinku who were ministering in the South Weipa community. The team was led by Kevin Rrurrambu who is Viceprincipal of Shepherdson College, the High School in Galiwinku. Kevin's team, all full-blooded Aborigines, were full of the love of Jesus and made an impressive impact on the Weipa community. The meetings were held in the open air in the open space outside the community snack bar over a period of four nights. There was plenty of happy singing and very little attention paid to the passing of time. Kevin's messages were powerful expositions of God's Word, and God obviously used them to draw people to himself, as numbers came forward every night. Interesting emphasis in Kevin's appeal apart from a call to come to Christ was that it was a call to come and join us - the Lord's family. It was great to see the winning of young people to Christ in this Aboriginal community.

## ABORIGINAL REVIVAL REPORT

#### **ALBION DOWNS**

"Out of this world" is how Errol Sorensen of Mt. Magnet described a Convention at Albion Downs which is about 600 kilometers inland from Geraldton. He was describing a gathering of about 250-300 Aborigines who met for a Christian Teaching Convention in October in 1982.

Seventy Aborigines from Mt. Margaret joined the Murchison Aborigines as Jack Cheyne cranked up Albion Downs 240 volts generator and the Convention began with spontaneous singing, testimonies, and teaching addresses. There was no official programme nor any apparent organisation, but the whole weekend went smoothly and in fact so beautifully that one could not help but be aware that the best organiser of all, the Spirit of God. was in control.

Errol's lasting impression of this Convention, is that the revival amongst Aborigines has sprung from among themselves and has not been imposed by Europeans. The songs and singing have a close identification with the land and Aboriginal culture is being woven into the Spiritual Revival.

These people need our support and prayers so as to develop and do their "own thing" in their dealings with the Lord.

#### KUNUNURRA

Our B.C.A. man at Kununurra, Tom Williams writes about two Mission girls, Molly and Agee. Molly became a Christian at the Forest River Mission and is now a member of the Kununurra Church and is much in prayer for her people who are not Christians. Agee is a Christian woman who lives in the bush and so is unable to get to Church. Agee can speak seven Aboriginal languages and when Tom calls to visit on his way to Halls Creek, she always stokes up the cast iron stove for a "cuppa" and a chat about Jesus.

#### **OODNADATTA**

Oodnadatta is a difficult spot in Chris Clerke's Leigh Creek Mission area, where the children play drunk mothers and fathers. imitating their parents. Recently Chris flew a Bible Translation team down from Ernabella to teach and assist the Oodnadatta Aborigines. Roderick and Graham, two Ernabella Christian elders found that most of the local Aborigines spoke Yankunytjatjara and Tunitja, languages closely related to Pitjantjatjara. They told the children at school the story of Adam and Eve in Pitiantiatiara and a large crowd attended a Christian meeting with one man asking for Jesus and receiving prayer. As a result of our B.C.A. man's initiative Pitjantjatjara cassettes will be available to the Oodnadatta people and a team of Christian Aborigines from Ernabella plan to hold a weekend Convention at Oodnadatta in 1983.

#### WEIPA

I want to share my experience of what I've found when the Galiwin'ku mission team was here. They were different people from us, but because they are God's people we were one happy family. God's family sharing the gifts of the Holy Spirit amongst each other it was just wonderful to have Brothers and Sisters like them.

My experience of what happened throughout the mission on Monday was something great for me. We went to Auntie Ina's house to pray for Uncle Cyril and because being a mother the old devil tried to rob me of my blessings that day but I just left everything in God's hands, and both Ted and I went up to share with the team. The Holy Spirit just blessed us throughout that morning meeting and Uncle Cyril and Auntie Ina were richly blessed.

The team had tea with us Monday night, everything seemed so busy again and I still felt that I didn't want to miss out. Although James was feeling feverish we just lifted him up to the Lord. We took the children to the snack bar for the service, after the service we went to the church for prayers and I praise God for that special night.

My spirit was filled with the chorus "FATHER MAKE US ONE" when I felt His fire alight in me. I can still go on and on and I praise God for this wonderful experience.

I pray that many more will soon be filled and touched and blessed by the Holy Spirit in their daily lives. As I can only say — HAPPY, HAPPY, HAPPY IN THE LORD. Praise God I am born again trusting in His word. I want you to know how happy I am — I'M HAPPY IN THE LORD.

#### WILUNA

Our new B.C.A. Missioner, Don Miller, reports from Leinster, W.A.

About 3-6 months ago a team of Aboriginal Christians came to Warburton from Elcho Island. The people of Warburton asked the Elcho Islanders to come as they had gone as low as they could go and even the police had stopped going because of the violence, etc. As a result of the Elcho Islanders visit an amazing spiritual revival occurred at Warburton, Many of the new Warburton Christians immediately began to evangelise and groups came to Mt. Margaret and Wiluna where a large number of Aboriginals became Christians.

At Wiluna the numbers turning to Christ were so devastating to the local publican that he offered six weekends of free beer to try and get his customers back. There has been some Aborigines falling away from their faith, but mainly due to a lack of Aboriginal Christian leadership and no follow-up. Recently a team of four Aborigines came into Wiluna from Elcho Island, for a week's teaching and this has had good results, with the local witch doctor making a commitment to Christ.

Our B.C.A. Missioner and the local Church of Christ lay preacher are working together to support the Wiluna Aborigines and a group is being encouraged to visit Laverton to evangelise the fringe-dwellers there.



Don Miller concludes, "The greatest help that can be given seems to be in the area of follow-up, encouraging new Christians to grow after commitment, and also in terms of basic evangelism, as in the Laverton area."

#### NUNGALINYA

Nungalinya (Aboriginal name for Old Man Rock), is a Combined Church Training and Research Centre in Darwin for Aborigines, run jointly by the Anglican and Uniting Churches. Last year 24 students studied English as a second language and the Diploma of Theology. The students came from Yuendumu (Central Australia); Darwin, Galiwin'ku, Milingimbi, Maningrida, Ramingining, Angurugu, Unbakumba, Roper River, Oenpelli (Northern Territory); Arukun, Townsville, Brisbane (Queensland); and Fiji.

As well as short courses for Christian Aboriginal Church leaders, Nungalinya has conA group of Aborigines from Mimilli in S.A. singing "I'm a New Creation" in Pitjantjatjara at a Christian "Inma". B.C.A.'s Bill and Gwen Ostling at Coober Pedy provide a support ministry to the Pitjantjatjara's of North West South Australia.

ducted extension courses in basic Bible teaching at Cairns (Qld.); Mowanjum (W.A.) and Ernabella (S.A.).

B.C.A. is strategically involved in training Aboriginal leaders and has supported Nungalinya with staff and finance. At present B.C.A. provides Gwen Newell's salary as college librarian. B.C.A. also has provided a small grant to the Aboriginal Evangelical Fellowship (A.E.F.) for their Bible College at Bimbadeen, Cootamundra, N.S.W.

## **IRON IN THEIR SOULS**

In October, the Dean of Sydney and Chairman of B.C.A., Lance Shilton visited the B.C.A. centres in North West Australia.

Dean Shilton reported, "You could think you were in a different country in the North West. I take my hat off to those who stay for long periods. Because of the intense heat and high humidity, some say 'visit the North West and die', others say, 'live in the North West and live'.

My visit included Paraburdoo, Tom Price, Dampier, Port Hedland, Wickham, Broome, Derby, Kununurra and Darwin.

Part of the time I was in the company of the recently elected Bishop of the North West, the Rt. Rev. Gerald Muston, who enthusiastically views his Diocese as one of the most exciting in the Anglican Communion.

Modern new mining towns grace the tough sunburnt countryside with air-conditioned facilities, refrigeration, fast plane travel and immediate communications which more than make up for the flies, the cockroaches, the snakes, redback spiders and the crocodiles.

The rapid change of personnel in the North West highlights the challenge to the Australian Church to provide an effective Christian witness.

The strategic importance of the 63 year old Bush Church Aid Society in taking new initiatives in remote areas is obvious and



needs the support of the whole church.

People are constantly coming and going in the North West. This makes it difficult to establish the local loyalty for the building and maintaining of church buildings. But this difficulty also presents a unique opportunity for outreach. Those brought to a point of Christian commitment could on their return spread the message throughout the country. It is an opportunity similar to that of a city Cathedral like St. Andrew's, Sydney, where thousands of people from all over the world are constantly coming and going.
