These 'death notices' make me ask "Do we as Christians not really believe that Jesus rose form the dead?" Why don't we take to heart His words that we will never die if we entrust ourselves to Him?" (John 11:26 "whoever lives and believes in me will never die").

We should strive to impact our society more with the truths we hold dear. Lets not allow papers to place our loved ones who die in the Lord as 'Death Notices'.

The Apostle Paul took every occasion to bring Jesus truth to impact upon others. As he wrote letters he filled the salutations with the revealed truths of the Lord.

# 'Better than a keg down at the Council'

# This comment was overheard after the thanksgiving service following the fires on Flinders Island in January this year.

It all started with a lightening strike. Parks and Wildlife officers were quickly on the job and had it "out"...but it wasn't. The next day was the beginning of three weeks of intensive fire fighting and the mopping up still continues and it will until there is a bit fall of rain.

Every available tanker on the island was going 24 hours a day in 12 hourly shifts. Tankers were ferried to the island as well as professional fire fighters. Nearly every 'ute' had a tank of some kind on it plus a pump and hose to deal with spot fires. There was a huge band of people making and delivering food and drinks to the fighters. There was hardly an able bodied person not fighting – and they were keeping essential services going. In all about a quarter of the island's bush and grassland was burnt.

Our part in all this was to be many things – Sue at the hospital and on the telephone at the Control centre when she 'knocked off'. Bob's part was some fire fighting, counselling duties, some fuel delivery, lots of 'gophering' and doing shifts at night on the radio at fire control where he became known as the 'Roving Rector'.

Bob also found himself in the firing line as his "Boss' was accused of starting the fire. Yet, most agreed it was the fire we had to have because of the massive build up of (peat) fuel. Every day Bob was asked if he was praying for rain, to which his answer was the fire still had much work to do, but that we had Christians all over the island praying for protection of people and property. As a consequence of the Lord's faithfulness in answering that prayer not one occupied house was lost and there were no major casualties. There were a few minor


casualties towards the end, as people became tired. The island is littered with miracles as a consequence of answered prayer.

The thanksgiving service involved many people – all the fire chiefs, the mayor and many others. There was a power point presentation of the fire photos and reminders of new life springing from the fire. The sermon focused on four key Christian words – thanks, sorry, change and joy – the people were encouraged to get up immediately and say these to people they needed to, and many took the opportunity to do so.

It was a special and emotional service of thanks, repentance and joy. Someone said that Bob had earned the right to have such a service because he and Sue had shared the fire with the Islanders.

Bob and Sue are on the Island because of you – supporters of the Bush Church Aid Society. Thank you from all on the Island and from Bob and Sue for enabling ministry here. Thank you for your prayers and your giving – both have been used to bring blessing through the graciousness of our great God.

During the recent fires on Flinders Island I was patrolling up and down a fire break with another bloke. Our job was to keep an eye out for any spot fires that may have started on the wrong side of the firebreak.

The fire was about 400 metres away and it was in
Tea Tree with flames probably three times the height of the trees.
It was both awe inspiring and very frightening. We watched the ring tailed possums and the wallabies make a bewildered bolt for life.

It was then that this statement was made, 'I think I will have to make a real change around in my life.' When questioned he made the classic statement. 'If hell's like that I don't want to go there!' Time will tell if he is prepared to carry his statement through.

The fires on Flinders Island didn't





seem to get too much coverage on the mainland but for the people here it was a three-week battle for their very survival. About one quarter of the island has been burnt but in answer to prayers God spared all residential buildings and personnel. He has also granted many people enough grass to get them through the summer providing it rains soon. We are constantly finding more miracles in answer to prayer.

Many opportunities for ministry have opened up because we were able to stand with the people here. This has been made possible through the work of the Bush Church Aid Society and all the people who give both money and their prayers to support this work. Thank you to all in God's family.

Summertime on the Monara is usually dry, hot and at times windy. This year, like many other regions we experienced drought conditions but we were well aware that many others were considerably worse off than we were.

Yes water restrictions were in force, but at least we did have some water for bathroom and kitchen use and our slight inconvenience heightened our awareness of the hardship being endured by others further out west. The awareness helped to muster support for our biannual Harvest Festival, proceeds, which were

designated to assist with the Bush Church Aid Society drought appeal.

Our small church community were busy nurturing garden produce with 'grey water' for many weeks prior to the day. Cakes and handicrafts were being prepared, but no-one was prepared for the frost which hit during the night preceding the festival. One day it was 30c the next was sleet, some snow and really very chilly. However, the atmosphere within St John's Anglican Church was warm and friendly as Brian Roberts gave us the Gospel message.

The auction bidding of Harvest produce in response to Brian Roberts and Kevin Stone was brisk, helping raise \$857.50 for BCA. Praise God for this wonderful provision of funds to help BCA help others in this long drought.

# Hope in the Desert

Four years ago when Jeanette and I came up to Paraburdoo/Tom Price the countryside was lush, creeks were running and the Shire had to mow the road edges fortnightly. Travelling at night was a slow journey with kangaroos and owls in the road. Sometimes whole herds of the healthiest cattle would be meandering across the road and one dark wet night I even had a horse trotting along side of me near the Wukathuni Aboriginal Community.

Then came the fires. The Station workers told me they had lost 60% of the stock feed in those first fires. The land was dry and the fires continued, some suspected lightening, others vandals. Over the past three years it's been hot and dry. From a distance there were still the colour contrasts, but up close I wondered how any creature could exist in the barrenness – this is truly desert. The sight of so much barren desolation was sobering, depressing. It was as if the fire and drought had snuffed out all hope of life and vitality.

When the prophet Isaiah addressed the Israelites in Isaiah 43:18-25, it was as if they were living in the



desert. Actually, they were living in Babylon, whose military powers had overwhelmed them some years previous, its might whipping through like wild fire driving them off to live in a land of exile. Their homes and temple had been destroyed, reduced to rubble, their nation laid ruin, and they were a captive people with little to hope for. It appeared to them that God had deserted them totally. Their future looked as bleak and devastated as the black grey ash land of the stations.

Why hope at all? It's not an uncommon question in our world, today. Hope can be extinguished by drought and the sight of the sad weary bones of the stock on the stations. Hope is also extinguished through a famine of the spirit – a slow starvation of all sense of meaning and purpose. Hope is threatened when all sense of joy has been stripped from the simple performance of basic work tasks. Constant injustices cause good people to lose heart and get worn down.

Now, this is all pretty bleak

- you could say it's a bit of a desert experience. It is into this kind of bleak situation and circumstances the prophet Isaiah appears with a word from the Lord of heaven and earth. The word is one of hope. God is about to do a new thing. He will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert.

Isaiah is holding out a hope. God can deal with your desert experience no matter how devastating it has been. God will MAKE a way through your wilderness. Even though you have ignored God failing to give him due honour, yet he will forgive your failings – such is his desire for you.

Interestingly, when the Hebrew people got back to the Promised Land there was still a lot to do. The city wall had to be restored, the temple had to be rebuilt, but in the slow step forward hope was restored.

The recent rains have not caused

our rivers to flow. Yet there is food for the stock, they are looking healthy again, the kangaroos are coming back and water holes are no longer dry. The signs of life and hope are returning even as new faces appear in town and some in church. In His service, we are like those summer showers, individually we can bring short-term refreshment – together we can bring refreshing life to a spiritual desert.

Things are not perfect. We are a bit like the Hebrews – there is much to be done – as we work out our salvation in hope, for hope grows as we serve the Lord. Ultimately we need always remember that the way is not a plan – it's a man – the man Jesus, who died and rose again that we might live for all eternity – our hope, always, is founded in our living relationship with him.

# From the Swedish Press

(Johan Almblad (photographer) & Caroline Engvall (reporter) visited Cober Pedy from Sweden and on their return they wrote two articles in swedish with pictures. My son Peter translated and the photos are mine. Ed.)

When the desert heat becomes too much the city slickers seek refuge in the church beneath the earth. "Welcome to the biggest culture shock on earth", says minister Rod Oldfield to his curious visitors in Australia's strangest church this Sunday.

The desert heat shimmers unmoving over the red dirt road. In the distance the road grows smaller and then disappears, it is 400km's to the next town.

Coober Pedy is one of the world's strangest places. On the bus here, a 12 hour journey from the closest city, Adelaide in S.A., we have for company some tough desert-men and an aboriginal family returning home, - and a couple of curious backpackers - like ourselves. Everyone draws breath at the town's UFO remains of space movies in the moon like landscape, as well as being fascinated by the underground church, Catacomb Church.

It is a sleepy small town we meet this particular Sunday morning, the temperature holds itself around 50 degrees in December. In the Catacomb



Church the faithful visitors gather half an hour before the service is due to begin. It is here that they find their nearest friends, the ones that they can trust. It can otherwise be difficult to know what to do in a place that in part embraces loneliness, in part in the world's opal capital, and where some residents try their best to kill each other.

Coober Pedy is a hard place for those with no friends. Many will be fooled/tricked, but Jesus has come to heal the wounds in your hearts and souls, – says the minister of the day Rod Oldfield, and receives murmurs of agreement from his small audience. One or two tourists have popped in, and all newcomers introduce themselves – afterwards they are warmly welcomed with Helen's homemade strawberry tarts and tea, after the first half of the service filled with psalms. Also the children have a central role (at least until the video in

the corner becomes more interesting). Furthermost in from the church there stands four cornerstones and Rod explains the difficult words in the psalms by laying out these 4 stones:

- 1. God loves me.
- 2. I have sinned.
- 3. Jesus died for me.
- 4. I have to make the choice to live with God.

Little Max has soon learnt all 4 by heart – with a little help from his mum, Lisa.

With the warm tea spreading through our veins, it feels good for Swedes that are used to the cold that the underground church holds a constant temperature of 22 degrees – all year round. The church room is drilled straight into the rock and spreads a soft light over Rod as he begins his sermon and the second half of the service.

"Many people live in a self made slavery and are forced to do things that they do not want to do. I myself lived a life like this until I found Jesus. Some of the things I did earlier in life are so rotten that I am too ashamed to tell even my wife about them. I know that I am not a wonderful person, but I was chosen and I know now that God understands.

Quiet spreads through the church. Everyone digests Rod's words and thinks of their own lives. And afterwards the congregation is ready to go out and try to make the world a little better - even here, in one of the world's strangest places.

"I was not a Christian when I came to Coober Pedy, but now the church is my family. It is a very special church, and it feels great that God is also living with us in the middle of the wilderness".

# My Lawns are Green



I tuned to country radio and listened to the news -

'there's still no rain in sight,' they said. I guess I could excuse

the many living on the land who gaze up to the sky

for wondering where the clouds have gone, how could it be so dry?

While those like me, now city based, enjoy each sunny day,

wish selfishly that cloudless skies would never go away

with little thought for country folk and their enormous need -

the starving stock, diminished crops, no water and no feed.

And then I focused on the calls that came to Macca's show

that Sunday morning, and I learnt some things I didn't know.

I sensed the desperation as they talked of wind and dust -

one lady said she'd leave the farm, she

felt she'd not adjust

to threats of further choking grit, she'd rather live in town than let the stress of cleaning up return and get her down.

The grassless paddocks, empty dams and stock routes closed as well decisions of great magnitude, what stock to keep or sell.

I also heard a farmer speak - he too owned land out west,

"I'd like to talk of drought," he said, "we thought we'd done our best by having sheds well stacked with hay and silos full of grain, enough to conquer any drought, but still we've felt the pain as now for months we've fed our sheep until the sheds are bare -

we do not know which way to turn, we don't know how or where. We're feeding stock it seems all day, there's just the wife and me, vou understand how tired we are - it's

endless, can't you see?"

I heard the sadness in his voice, how thoughtless I had been as I ignored the country plight because my lawns are green while he has non-existent crops, and others fear they'll lose their meagre stalks to emu hordes and mobs of kangaroos. Agistment that is hard to get, the shocking price of hav and other feed, while stock when sold are almost given away. But gratitude is truly there for governmental aid,

assistance too that others give, the part that they have played. There's been a little rain since then. again the phones ran hot as puddles formed: 'and inch or two,' they said 'was not a lot nor would it break this long term drought but still it gives us hope for we know now it still can rain, so maybe we can cope! I may feel insulation from the heartache to be found in the bush that at the moment is a

parched and thirsty ground but now I know that I can show I care. that I can give

and maybe help a sheep, a cow, a farmer's hope to live.



# THE DROUGHT IS NOT OVER YET !!!

At the commencement of BCA's involvement in the supply of fodder to drought stricken farmers we had no idea that after nine months there would still be the need to do exactly the same thing! Buying fodder at the best prices possible, arranging drivers for the delivery and organising the distribution to farmers through our Field Staff and other members of clergy able to participate in such a project.

There has been talk that if the drought breaking rains had not come by now farmers from five generations of farming would have to walk away from their properties. Consider how tedious and frustrating it is for those on the land who STILL have not had sufficient drought breaking rains. How tiring for those who are still hand feeding stock, still ploughing land in the hope that rains will fall and the earth be replenished, and still wondering whether they will even survive the drought financially.

Around Tibooburra and across to White Cliffs in New South Wales they have had heavy follow up rains – but as is the nature of rain – some received a lot of rain and others very little. This has been the story around most of the drought-affected areas.

But farmers have a way of always looking out for the other person – they seem to think they are better

off than those on the next farm – "he needs the help more than me! – so let him have the hay". Our Field Staff have often heard these words over recent months.

It's the "real" Australian attitude isn't it? – standing by the other person. It is encouraging to know that the "real" Australian spirit is still there despite the drought and current hardships these people are facing. In fact when Rev. Alan Hoskin was arranging hay to be delivered to White Cliffs last month, the people there contacted him to say, that with the rain, they were better off than the people around Wilcannia – and so the hay was delivered into Wilcannia.

But nine months and more than 130 semi-trailer loads of fodder down the dusty roads, sees the Society still committed – with God's grace – to provide fodder to the farmers, vouchers in support of businesses in rural communities and the hope that comes from a relationship with Christ.

Please continue to help BCA take the gospel of hope to those still suffering from the drought as we assist in practical ways.

# The Darling Flows again



# You may think we have Water on the Brain but we have become aware how precious it is and what a wonderful gift from God!

Our water at Broken Hill has been deteriorating in quality over the last 12 months and we are currently buying water in 10 litre casks for drinking. Another good rain this month has removed the threat of 'no water left in six months' but the quality is still poor. BUT we are off rather severe water restrictions and we may see the many lovely gardens in Broken Hill revive. Broken Hill usually has an almost perfect climate for roses!

Please keep praying for rain. THE DROUGHT IS NOT OVER YET. Up around Tibooburra and across to White Cliffs they've had heavy follow up rains for which we thank God but even there - as is the nature of rain - some received lots and others little. This week I was arranging Hay to be delivered to the White Cliffs area but they kindly contacted me to say that with the rain they are better off than the people around Wilcannia. So

two huge double Semi-trailer loads of Hay from BCA Drought Aid will be delivered this week and next week around the Wilcannia area. The town of Tibooburra has moved from carting water to now having enough water in their Dam for the next two years!

We would like to share with you a parable Philippa heard recently and which resonated with us both [with our own colouring!]:

PREAMBLE: You possibly have no idea what it's like to see water pouring down the Darling River from Queensland. Towns on the Darling hold celebration parties to watch it arriving and we heard one Grazier interviewed on the radio who had mixed feelings. He was celebrating with all the others but was a bit dismayed to see in the tumbling rolling mess that comes with the first water his prize Bull drowned and rolling amid the bits of trees and rubbish! But he still sounded happy! Currently the waters have reached Menindee [something they didn't expect to happen] and it's beginning to fill our Lake Weatherall. This is the

source of our drinking water supply to Menindee and Broken Hill. Praise the Lord! The fishing is proving extra good too!

THE PARABLE: A dry riverbed parched by a long drought. People living either side desperate for water. In normal conditions the water has provided for them and their stock but currently all is brown and dust and the river empty. Beautiful rains from Queensland arrive and down the riverbed flows the precious water. The first part is brown, salty and unfit for anything. Everything is tossing and turning chaotic – but be patient! – After it's all settled, beautiful clean clear water flows and life resumes its 'normal' way.

INTERPRETATION: Australians [and the world?] have been through a spiritual drought. Many were aware of their need of the Living Water and many not. New fresh Living Waters are on their way but first comes the rubbish and the chaos and we are in the midst of that today. Chaos of

Rapid Change, Conflicting Spiritual Voices, Anxiety, New and old Gurus offering Quick fixes all tumbling round together. But be patient! Wait for these things to roll by. They will all disappear and only the True Pure Living Water will remain.

Jesus said: "If you believe in me, come and drink! For the Scriptures declare that rivers of living water will flow out from within." (When he said "living water," he was speaking of the Spirit, who would be given to everyone believing in him. But the Spirit had not yet been given, because Jesus had not yet entered into his glory.)
