

This question has been on my heart and mind over the last year in the role of BCA Youth Promotions Officer, and it is greatly encouraging to know and have witnessed that this is on the hearts and minds of many folk connected with Bush Church Aid also. Thank you for all the ways in which you are faithfully supporting youth ministry across Australia.

Twelve months on in this role, some of the most thrilling experiences in visiting youth groups, church services, school chapels and youth events last year have been seeing youth respond to God's Word in Matthew 9:35-38 by pledging to pray for

Why BCA is Committed to Disaster Response Projects ...

- "1 But now, this is what the Lord says
- he who created you, Jacob, he who formed you, Israel: "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine.
- ² When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze.

³ For I am the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your Saviour'".

(Isaiah 43:1-3)

God has always been interested in the plight of his people. His deepest concern

for his people is for their welfare and their wellbeing. When the waters rise up and the flames descend, God's promises that these experiences would not completely engulf his people or totally destroy them but rather that he will be personally with his people, to redeem them. God is able to achieve this promise because of his character, because of who he is, the "Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, your saviour" (Isaiah 43:3).

Jesus is the ultimate expression of God being with us. Jesus is God come amongst us, not just to suffer alongside us, but more significantly, to die for us so to bring us back into relationship with God. Today, in times of crisis, when the waters rise up and the flames threaten to destroy, Jesus is ever-present, with his body, the church, the instrument with which he acts to provide for the needs and redemption of his people.

BCA's disaster response projects are an expression of Jesus' presence with his people in times of suffering and hardship. These projects are to continue as a central

component of BCA's ongoing work through which Jesus will continue to be a presence in rural and regional Australia in times of hardship and disaster.

The following is an overview of some of BCA's previous disaster relief projects.

Kinglake VIC - Emergency Chaplain Programme

Following the devastating February 2009 Black Saturday Bushfires, BCA in partnership with the Melbourne Anglican Diocese supported the work of Ernest and



Ida Horth as emergency chaplains in and around the township of Kinglake. Over a period of 2 years following the disaster, Ernest and Ida visited locals in the area, offering friendship, emotional support and spiritual counselling.

Bendigo VIC - Our Place Ministries, Community Outreach

Also following the February 2009 Black Saturday Bushfires, the Anglican Diocese of Bendigo in partnership with BCA and other non-government Christian based charities, established a disaster response programme known as Our Place Ministries. The programme involved initial disaster response activities such as counselling and chaplaincy services, material aid, and a programme of community activities such as play groups, and other support groups.

Western NSW - BCA Drought Aid Programme

The early 2000's were a period of dry conditions and limited rain over a large part

of Western NSW. In response to concerns regarding the plight of drought-affected communities, BCA introduced a programme known as 'Drought Aid'. The 'Drought Aid Programme' involved a number of elements including the weekly delivery of stock



fodder to 21 locations across western NSW over an 18-month period, informal community gatherings as part of the weekly fodder deliveries; and the introduction of a voucher programme redeemable in some local retail outlets in drought affected communities.

BCA Celebrates Christmas



There were a number of joyous gatherings as BCA celebrated Christmas at the end of 2013. All over the country there were a number of festivities, Christmas services and carols held in different locations by BCA Field Staff. Our first story is from Holbrook, NSW which took place on Christmas Eve...

As a way of celebrating Jesus' birth and connecting with families, a new family and children's carol service was held on Christmas Eve at Holbrook this year. We attempted the same thing in 2012, but a freak windstorm at 4pm brought down many trees in the area (including one which just missed the house), and led to a number of people staying away. Thankfully, this year, the weather was uneventful. The service, however, was lively! We were thrilled to have 38 adults and 24 children come along. We held it in the church hall which was decorated with a nativity scene and Christmas tree and lots of lights and

tinsel. Children dressed up and a few of them brought in gifts during We Three Kings. The service included a number of Bible readings, many carols, a puppet play, a short video and talk, prayers, and a retelling of the Christmas story using different types of chocolates. During parts of the service we shut the blinds and turned off the main lights to give it a dreamy atmosphere – very nice during Silent Night. Reports from both adults and children, including regular and non-regular church attenders, were very positive. We thank God that the service went so well, and pray that those who came would have left with a clear understanding of the priceless gift of Christ and how precious it is to know him.

Barry and Avril Luke have felt the immediate support from their Bush Church Aid family. The Luke's have been in Roxby Downs for twenty three years, are firmly planted in the community and now having joined BCA last year, are ready for new challenges and even greater rewards this year.

They have felt the immediate support knowing that one day each month there will many people praying for them. Barry explained that, "It changes your heart and means we are not in this alone and we have this immediate family and prayer support and encouragement." Job security is a big issue in these communities and Barry, who is a Chaplain at the Olympic Dam mining

site, knows that these times of uncertainty are challenging for the mining industry. "They need something that is stable and God is stable, they need stability." The isolation in Roxby Downs is also a challenge not only for workers on the mining sites; it's just as much a challenge for their families at home. "People just need to hear good news stories. There is always a God ordained time to share his love. Any time is a good time," Barry says. He desires to make every meeting he has, God glorified.

Avril works as the Parish
Administrator at the Roxby
Downs Community Church,

coordinating the Know Your Bible Study each week as well as being part of the Pastoral Care Ministry and gets to talk to a lot of women in the area too. "Having been there for so many years, joining with BCA is another part of the progression within our community and when people heard Barry was becoming chaplain they said, about time too," Avril said. Upon taking on the role with BCA, Avril told me that, "It was amazing to receive emails from two people we didn't even know and haven't met to encourage us."

Just before the end of last year, Barry was ordained and commissioned with his wife to start their journey as BCA Field Staff. Barry recounts his journey of before

and after the event and what it means for them. As he and the two other Ordinands started the retreat on Tuesday night, four days before they were to be Ordained, he was told it was going to be a silent retreat and thought, "here we go, this is not going to work for me, I am a person who enjoys interacting with people, you know, listening and TALKING! Me silent, you must be joking!" Though as the retreat went on, he was quite surprised that it was actually a joy to be silent and take in the great teaching from Bishop John Stead, to explore God and His word. Bishop John and Jan made them feel very welcome and Barry was blessed by their company and hospitality. When the big day arrived, he remembered very little of the rehearsal.

except instead of butterflies in the stomach, it was like Gazelles on steroids. "During the service it hit me that I was being ordained as a Deacon, into God's service and I became quite overwhelmed and quite humbled as the emotions started welling up inside me, I was starting to get tears forming as I was facing the congregation. I needed to stop and focus on what was actually happening, as I was certainly going to miss a cue from the Bishop if I wasn't careful," Barry said.

Which Bank? Food Bank!



What better way to love as a church, than to be able to give away to those who are in need. That is exactly what APOSS (or the Anglican Parish Of Sunraysia South) has begun to do through a new and exciting programme which directly works to serve the local community.

The new initiative at Sunraysia South in 2013 was the establishment of a food bank outlet. The church had been receiving requests for practical help from time to time. We were trying to service this through a voucher system, but it was becoming financially unviable. We met with a representative from Foodbank Victoria and found out how we could be involved as a food bank outlet. We first needed a place to store the food. Thanks to the generosity of a congregation member, we were able to purchase a second hand compactus unit which was ideal. The church orders food as required and it is delivered to the church. The food is either free or at a greatly reduced rate and delivery is also included. At the moment we just have non-perishable goods as we do not yet have the facilities to store refrigerated or frozen food. The food is put in family size boxes to hand out to people.

Our goal is not to become a major agency of food relief. However, we do want to care for our community members in practical ways as well as spiritual ways. We want to proclaim and live the gospel. It is great that as a church we are able to serve our community in this way. It is envisioned that most of the people we help out will be through personal relationships. People helped so far have included fruit pickers from the Pacific islands, a grieving family from the local primary school, and some locals who are struggling. This is a team ministry and it is served well by Fay, Mark, Ruth, and Clare who all play an important role. We thank God that he has enabled this ministry to begin. In God's grace it may play its part in our overall ministry of proclaiming Christ and living as followers of Jesus. Thanks to BCA supporters for your continued support and prayers that have been vital in our ministry.

Mooroopna is located in central Victoria, across the river from Shepparton, approximately 2 hours north of Melbourne. The Mooroopna Anglican Church is found



A Different Nomadic Experience

Nomads at work

2014 promises to be a year building on the blessings of 2013. It presents so many opportunities to make a difference and encourage.

Being a BCA Nomad presents a wonderful way to combine travel and service, utilising our life skills, gifts, crafts and professional training, be it near to

home, across the continent or on one of the islands of our Southern shores, for a week or as long as we are called.

How often when talking about BCA Nomads do we hear the expression 'grey' in the description, and while

it is true that predominantly the ministry is made up of retired couples able to spend time travelling, it should not be perceived as limited to these people. A percentage of the ministry of assisting 'Bush Churches' follows a pattern of advanced planning, often with months of notice of tasks required. Nungalinya College in Darwin was just such an example in 2013 (and will be in 2014) whereby Property Manager, Neil Black and BCA were able to plan well in advance the considerable amount of assistance our Nomads would be able to contribute to the college. That it was beneficial to the college is best expressed by Dr Jude Long - Principal - "we couldn't have done it without you."

Nungalinya and locations in the far

North and West may not be feasible destinations for Nomads to assist where, allowing for travel, practically one needs a minimum of 4 weeks. Closer to those of us living in the East however does present opportunities for shorter term nomading, and the flexibility to respond to requests for assistance from the 'Field Staff'. Early in the

year the Nomads were able to respond on several such situations. Adelong/Tarcutta was in need of urgent maintenance on their church property, a request met on short notice by several teams

of Nomads from Sydney. They made such a difference that it featured in the 'Tumut/ Adelong Times! Walgett / Collarenebri also benefitted greatly from the availability of BCA Nomads to respond on minimum notice. Tory and Jo Cayzer, recently moved from Tamworth into Walgett where much needed to be done on all the church properties both there and Collarenebri. This situation was met by a strong team from St James Turramurra. Apart from the belief that nomading is for 'oldies' and a long term commitment, another misconception of being a BCA Nomad is that of believing that it's all about 'church property maintenance' that one needs both the skills and physical abilities to undertake such labours. Not so, the following is a small

representation of ministry opportunities expressed by the Field Staff.

We're always looking for speakers for our men's and women's breakfasts, OH&S and Risk Management Assessment Training, Church canteen duties at community functions. A development business plan for a Coffee Shop and Women's Craft Nights, as well as curtain making for BCA House, developing promotional material, DVD's. Power Points etc. There is a need for cooking Ministry for freezing, craft workshops, teaching computer skills and communication technology.

As so aptly expressed by Sir Wilfred Grenfell: "When you set out to commend your Gospel to men who do not particularly want it, there is only one way to go about it - to do something for them that they will be sure to understand."

We should not lose sight of the rich rewards that fellowship, support and sharing brings both to ourselves, and significantly to those in the field in near and isolated locations. You can learn more on BCA Nomads at bushchurchaid.com.au

There are many circumstances in life that bring new experiences and change, although that does not always require moving in a geographical sense.

It can in fact happen in many other ways. Something new can always take place for individuals and families and that was definitely the case for BCA Field Staff Stuart Haynes and his family towards the end of 2013

Stuart and Katherine and their daughter Christina have been living in the central Queensland mining town since the beginning of 2013. They have been serving at the local Anglican Church and Katherine also works as a chaplain at the local high school.

Recently Stuart was called to embark on a new part of his journey and another aspect of his ministry in Moranbah that required a big step of faith. Stuart was ready and willing to take that step and was ordained as a deacon by Bishop Godfrey Fryar at St Paul's Cathedral, Rockhampton on 1st November 2013. It was the start of something new for Stuart and it was important that he was able to have the support that is so crucially important when embarking on a new journey. Reflecting on the ordination Stuart recalls that, "in some respects it was like the beginning. It was wonderful having family come along to support me, including my wife Katherine, my daughter Christina, my parents Frank and Helen, our Aunty Jan from the Gold Coast, cousin Debbie from Hervey Bay and friends from all around the Diocese, lan McGrath (BCA's Queensland/North NSW Regional Officer) came up from Brisbane with his wife, wonderful support all round."

It was clear that this decision was not one that Stuart took lightly and he shared about the journey so far and how this turning point was one of great significance when he said that, "A beautiful symbol I was given whilst on retreat before the Ordination that represented my heart and ministry. It was a bowl and towel. Just as

Jesus served, this is my desire, to serve both God and others. The Ordination in this respect is the beginning of this lifelong service and calling and discovering the true value of people from God's perspective." This not only represents Stuart's heart, it represents how he realises the call of God on his life and that he wants to put people on the forefront of his mind and heart. That was an important step for Stuart to recognise and the reason he will be able to have those interactions with people in a meaningful way.

The nature of life in Moranbah means that people are constantly moving in and out of town and that can mean it is often hard to get to know people. However that will be no barrier for the work that God has led Stuart and the Haynes family to in that place and that will not interrupt what God is trying to achieve through them. What Stuart and his family have recognised is that what they are doing there is important for the work of the gospel and for Christ to reach the people of that town. It is something that they want to continually strive for and BCA will continue to pray that people come to know Christ in that place and are partnering with them in that mission. It is great to hear how passionate people are, even when they have been in ministry for a number of years. This ministry is certainly one that God will continue to bless in the years to come and it will be exciting to hear exactly how God does that.

In the words of Stuart himself it is, "For the King of kings".

I really enjoyed looking after their chickens and taking their two dogs for walks through the vineyards. Secondly, the congregation had opportunity to pull together, to keep the wheels turning and to put on some great meals for this visiting Deacon. Lastly, my faith and trust in God's provision and leading is now absolutely without doubt.


God forgave me forty years ago. I continue to be overwhelmed with gratitude as I experience His love and forgiveness every dav.

and Kununurra, before he and Jo attended Trinity Theological College in Perth. They have two children - Lydia (21/2 years) and Eli just 4 months old.




Canon John Livingstone read a simple service of committal He spoke of a man who honoured God and served him faithfully.





Mapson Williams 31.7.1918 - 8.12.2013



The Ku-ring-gai Male Choir, of which Jim was a member sang at the Thanksgiving Service. Jim is survived by his wife of 50 years and 7 months, Helen, and his children Jane and Stephen and their families. The Revd Roger Green who conducted the Thanksgiving Service said of Jim's working life, that "BCA was where lim was meant to he"

Sr. Vaisey Cochrane who was Sister-in-Charge at Tarcoola Hospital and then at Coober Pedy died last Christmas Eve aged 90. Her funeral was held at Williamstown. where Sr. Cochrane had done her General Nursing training at the District Hospital from 1943-1946 and returned to following 51/2 years with BCA. She served at Ceduna/ Penong from 1960-61, Tarcoola and Cook Hospitals from 1961-65 and finally at Coober Pedy from 1965-66.

From the Archives

Everyone thought Nickel was the future... And so did BCA.

This year marks the centenary of the Diocese of Kalgoorlie, which lasted for only fifty eight years before being re-absorbed into the Diocese of Perth. The following story of BCA's involvement in that Diocese

is a timely reminder that while a lot in our world is temporary, the fruit of God's work will last forever.

Kambalda and Norseman were not pop-up mining towns in WA. Being near Kalgoorlie they were the result of gold discoveries in the late 1890's. So in the 1960's when the discovery of the Nickel deposits under Kambalda

happened, it caused huge excitement from the local shop keeper through to the stock markets of the world. The free nickel price skyrocketed from £1500 per ounce to £7000 in just 10 months during 1969. Mining and prospecting companies were everywhere and that meant people uprooted from elsewhere and moved in; causing fractured families and lives scattered, with the church struggling to do more than an occasional Eucharist a few times a year. Poseidon's shares may have risen from under \$1 to

\$270 in just three months, but the local church could not afford to pay a minister even if it could find someone to go.

While iron ore set the new outback ministry of the 50's going in NWA's Pilbara region for BCA, it was only a decade later that the nickel boom of the late 60's sent

calls for help from the Bishop of Kalgoorlie to 135 Bathurst Street.




boom, with the isolated contacts along the Eyre Hwy. Meanwhile in Kambalda, Ray Neve, fresh from BCA Wilcannia and Menindee saw full-on ministry generated by the Nickel boom, for a term before moving to fill the spot vacated by Blair at Norseman, while Charlie White carried on the work pioneered at Kambalda.


Alas! The Boom had passed and the church now started making arrangements for amalgamations. First Kambalda and Norseman joined, then the Anglican and Uniting and finally and significantly the Diocese of Kalgoorlie was absorbed back into the Diocese of Perth. This gave the Bishop of Perth an instant load of struggling areas to cover. It was significant because BCA had a working charter at the time that would focus its resources in rural and country dioceses and not Metropolitan ones.

The task now was to work out a solution which honoured the work laid down by the BCA clergy and local people over the previous fifteen years and vet ask the Perth diocese to take the running for finding the clergy and finance for their own 'bush' areas. Not wanting to cause distress but move towards honouring the BCA charter, the Society supported ministry for the next ten years to allow for an orderly transition. Periods of a grant-in-aid and then the placement of a local diocesan man Ron Ross in 1988. At the end of Ron's term in late 1992 the Society's task was complete. Many Australians had been reached with the gospel and ministered to in the name of Christ.

Kambalda Mine




HIP HIP HOORAY

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
