Editorial

Be the neighbour – near and far

As I write this, I'm on my way to Cloncurry to visit the Owen family, who serve faithfully in Cloncurry and Julia Creek – taking seriously the idea of 'going the distance' to share Jesus with the bush. As I drive, I've been reflecting on the Parable of the Good Samaritan which I recently preached on, and how being a neighbour is at the heart of ministry in Cloncurry.

Jesus clearly shows us that when it comes to our neighbour, we're not just talking about the person over your fence you chat to when checking the mail. Our neighbour also includes the one who lives thousands of kilometres away, in a rural or remote town you may have never been to.

The question asked in the parable of the Good Samaritan is this: if you see the need, will you act? Will you go and do likewise? It's easy to think that being a neighbour is just about feeding someone's dog while they're away or dropping over a meal. And it is that! But it's also about being a neighbour near and far – to the people of Coober Pedy, the rugged Pilbara, the wilderness of Tasmania, and many other parts of this country.

BCA has been 'going the distance' for over a hundred years, helping churches in the bush to keep proclaiming Jesus where there may be no other church for hundreds of kilometres. All BCA Field Staff, including the Owen family living and

serving in Cloncurry and Julia Creek, can do what they do because of neighbours like you, who faithfully pray and give to BCA. It is your willingness to be the neighbour near and far, through your generosity and prayers, that makes their ministry possible.

Our gracious Lord saw our need, crossed the divide, and saved us. He is the ultimate neighbour. May he grant us eyes to see the need and the boldness to act, so that we might 'go and do likewise'. That we might continue to go the distance and be the neighbour – near and far.

Former BCA Indigenous Theological Bursary Student, Lonny Bendessi is now serving as Field Staff with the Aboriginal Berean Community Church. Here he will receive practical ministry training amongst First Nations People. Lonny will combine his work with completing his associate degree at the Bible College of South Australia.

"First and foremost I would like to give thanks & praise to God for His calling on my life," says Lonny. "I would ask BCA supporters to please pray for my studies; that God will give me wisdom & understanding and uphold me as I seek to do His will."

After two and a half years without a minister-in-charge, King Island have new Field Staff who started in August. We welcome Tom & Tanya Killingbeck together with their kids Calimë, Tristan & Chiara.

Tom has been a Chaplain in the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) for the past 10 years. He most recently served in Queensland.



"I believe that Tanya, our kids and I are in a good place to contribute to the mission of BCA, as we are fundamentally country folk, and we fundamentally believe the Gospel is urgently required in hard-to-reach places like the bush," says Tom. "Tanya's skills as an early childhood educator will be a great asset on the Island, and I have the training and experience to operate as a minister in a remote location."



David & Margy Williams have commenced serving in the Anglican Parish of West Coast Tasmania, which includes the townships of Queenstown and Strahan. They have a passion to encourage the faithful to be more like Jesus, and to see people come to know him.

David was most recently a country pastor in Strathalbyn, South Australia and previously worked as the CMS SA/NT Regional Director.

"We hope to make a contribution by being faithful to Christ and sharing his truth and love with the local churches and community on the West Coast of Tasmania," says David. "I aim to teach God's word clearly and faithfully, engage with current secular challenges and equip the saints to love one another and engage with the world."

Pat & Issy O'Keeffe are moving to Katherine in the Northern Territory in October, a parish we last supported in 2020.

Pat has been the Assistant Minister at Northbridge Anglican since 2019. Issy is a NESA accredited teacher and registered psychologist.

James & Charly Boardman and their kids have been in the Parish of Kelso since January this year. It's been a huge year for them as the church is celebrating its bicentenary. James tells us more:

I like to say we hit the ground sprinting in Kelso. For the first four months, there was a bicentenary celebration almost every second weekend. This provided a wonderful opportunity to engage with people who are in our church's orbit, don't have a Christian background, but like the church on top of the hill.

First, we had two cemetery tours, which were really well attended. And I was very excited by the Holy Spirit moment when I got to stand up and say, "If you enjoyed tonight and the 200 years of history of people who stayed in the grave, why don't you come on a Sunday morning and hear



the 2000-year history about people who come out the grave?".

Our baptism and wedding display had 200 people attend over two days. The church also runs two fetes a year which raise a significant amount of money for the parish. The first one had about 800 people coming through. This is a great opportunity for outreach, so I asked one of our BCA partner churches, St Paul's Castle Hill, to bring a team across. The team did face painting and balloon animals. We had many opportunities to invite people to church, and some came!

The Bicentenary celebration itself was a wonderful occasion. We invited various local dignitaries and leaders of other denominations to come. The main draw card was Archbishop of Sydney Kanishka Raffel, and I believe this was Kanishka's first official act as Metropolitan of New South Wales. He preached on 1 Peter 2:4–10, about the church being built on Christ. The service was led by Bishop Mark, and we had around 120 people attend. After the service we installed a 2025

stone on our gate, made by one of our parishioners (see above). The gate was built for our centenary, so it was nice to have matching plaques for 1925 and 2025.

In August we had a high tea, we will run another cemetery tour in September, and then host an organ recital in November with a prominent Sydney organist. Preceding the organ recital, we are running a five-week evangelistic course called Hymns We Love. This will look at five familiar hymns like 'How great that art', and explain the theological significance behind the words. Those five hymns are going to be part of the repertoire played at the recital. There seems to be a modern trend of Gen Z seeking more traditional service styles, particularly because the timelessness

in those services transcends changes in society, so my prayer is that we attract a lot of people.

This time last year our church was averaging 25 people on a Sunday. For most of this year we've averaged about 45 people. Some have come through bicentenary events, and others have been invited by their friends. I'm really encouraged by how many of our congregation are inviting people to church.

In our church there is one young boy who was the only child for the last 10 years, so with the addition of our three, we started the year with four children each week. We've had others join, including a young girl who was baptised here in 2014 who has returned with her Mum, then someone who did Hope Explored at the Cathedral has been coming on and off with his son. One lady from church brought her granddaughter, and we've had a new family join, so recently we had nine kids! That young boy who was on his own at church for so long is over the moon.

There is certainly a lot to give thanks to God for.

Since starting in outreach ministry with the Aboriginal Berean Community Church, Jack & Lill Harradine have ministered in Port Lincoln including Ceduna and the Koonibba Aboriginal community, Meningie, Tailem Bend and Murray Bridge. In June they moved to Copley to re-open the Copley Christian Fellowship. Here Jack will pastor the faithful in Copley, Nepabunna and Leigh Creek. BCA has a long history with Leigh Creek, having first sent missioners (Field Staff) there in 1963. Jack tells us how they had a flying start in Copley...

Some years ago, I think around 2011/2012, we visited Copley with a retired Anglican minister and his wife. At the time they had a minister there from the South Sea Islands, but a few years ago he had a massive stroke and there hasn't been regular ministry since.

For quite some time, some people in Copley had been asking Lill and I to come back. But there was asbestos in the lino floor of the main meeting room and the bathroom and laundry had asbestos walls, all which made the building unusable. So there wasn't any point in coming, because there was nowhere to meet.

One day I happened to be talking to the National Manager of Mobile Mission Maintenance. He said to me, "Jack, we have worked in every state and territory in Australia, except for South Australia. Is there someplace we can work?" and my mind went to Copley.

When I told him about Copley, he was excited and keen to send a crew. Volunteers came from all around Australia in May and they renovated the place from top to bottom. They spent about two weeks, working on it every day. God then spoke to us and said, "Copley's got a nice new building, but they don't have a pastor."

We had our last day in Murray Bridge on Wednesday 18 June and arrived in Copley on Thursday 19 June. We held outreach on the Friday and Saturday and officially reopened the church on Sunday 22 June. I also baptised a lady who had a dramatic conversion three years ago.

Everyone has been just so, so welcoming and so glad that we're here. There are no other churches around, and these little places matter. Copley has about 60–80 people and Leigh Creek has 160–180. Leigh Creek was a mining town, but when the mine closed the population went from 800 to 160 in just two months.

We are the only ministry between Marree (114km north) and Nepabunna (57km east). We have one service in Copley and one in Leigh Creek. A lady who lives on a cattle station, travels all the way from Marree, about 1.5 hours' drive. She's a whitefella but we never, ever discriminate. We have a couple of whitefellas in the congregation. These people all went to school

together. There are more blackfellas here but it's a mix, and no one seems to care.

One lady who came to Bible Study said, "I'm so thankful to God for sending you here," she was almost in tears. This is what we hear every day. We just keep trusting in God and thanking Him for the fact that we're here.

It's a beautiful place because it's so rugged, but it is really isolated. We're almost at the start of the Birdsville Track and the Oodnadatta Track – two of the most famous, if not the most famous in Australia. For any Nomads reading, Copley is well worth a look!

Please pray that God protects us in our ministry as there is still some black magic practiced out here. Pray for God to open doors. Pray also for resources, because we urgently need some study Bibles. Many people out here have King James Bibles, and they'd never heard of study Bibles. May we teach well and bear fruit for the Lord.



Since late 2021, the First Nations Ministry Training Program (FNMT) has quietly but steadily grown into a vital ministry equipping Indigenous Christians for gospel service across rural, regional and remote Australia.

"We've now had around 105 students come through the program," says founding principal Dennis Taylor. "Some have gone on to further theological studies, while others are actively ministering in their communities. It's been a great encouragement to see people growing in their knowledge of the Bible, salvation, and how to serve the local church."

The program began formally in September 2023 but had been running in various forms since late 2021. What started as a one-person initiative has expanded to include part-time and volunteer staff. "We've been blessed with a small but faithful team," Dennis says. "One former volunteer is now employed 15 hours a week, and a



young man has recently joined in a voluntary role."

Challenges remain, especially in terms of funding, staffing, and the logistics of travel to remote regions. "We're always looking for support to keep the program running and growing," says Dennis. "And as we extend into more regions, we need more trained people on the ground."

Despite these challenges, Dennis remains hopeful. "We're planning ahead. I've approached a few respected men to consider taking on leadership roles in the future. They haven't said no – and we're praying."

With continued prayer, support, and gospel partnership, the First Nations Ministry Training Program is laying strong foundations for future Indigenous church leadership.

"We're not just training individuals," says Dennis. "We're building up churches and preparing the next generation to lead with faith and confidence in Christ."

I spent my childhood in Kununurra. In 1965 it was a remote East Kimberly town of around 1000 people. My father, The Revd Barry Green, and my mum, Jan, had said 'yes' to the Bush Church Aid Society when asked to uproot their young family from St Paul's Cooma. I was five and my brother Philip was a toddler. My parents were twenty-seven.

The Ord River project, the construction of the Kununurra Diversion Dam, and the Argyle Dam, were in full swing. There was no Anglican priest in the North-West. Dad would be the first.

At the completion of an epic road trip, 4000 kilometres of mostly dirt roads north from Perth, through Carnarvon, Onslow and Broome, we approached the Diversion Dam. Our journey had been relatively uneventful apart from the sibling fights mixed with spilt cordial and tears! It was hot, dry and dusty. The water at the edge of the dam beckoned my father, a good swimmer who had grown up with the ocean in Wollongong. But not my mum, a non-swimmer, raised in Kurrajong in the Blue Mountains. Dad made a split decision, one that could have changed our destiny. He turned the wheel of our vehicle and headed towards a boat ramp where the mud-brown water lapped. He took a dip while Mum, my brother and I stood at the edge. I didn't see my mother disappear into the Ord, or hear the firm voice of my father telling me to hold my brother's hand and not let go. But I will always see the figure of my mum, water dripping from her hair, tracking down between the buttons of her sodden navy blue linen sleeveless top, her matching shorts stuck to her wet legs. And there was the unspoken moment, the silence of a miracle.

My father spoke of this childhood memory when I was writing about my medical story. How he thought he had lost his wife when she had slipped into the river. He dived beneath the surface of the murky water and desperately reached around him to seek her. He resurfaced and saw a sole air bubble

floating at a distance. He lunged towards it and with his outstretched hand felt the top of my mother's head and lifted her from a watery grave. What were the odds? I reckon that counts as a 'God moment'.

It was the first of many 'what ifs' as my parents grew their young family, adding my twin sisters in 1966. Mum said that we had quardian angels 24/7 within our home. There was no local doctor. Communication was limited, though our church house had a landline phone. We had fans: not air-conditioning. and no television. I missed fresh milk and crunchy green apples. My mum placed a grocery order every six months which would be shipped to Wyndham for collection - toothpaste, soap and toilet paper, tins of Sunshine powdered milk and Carnation milk, Vegemite, cans of tuna fish, baked beans, corn and Golden Circle pineapple rings. Station people would give us sides of Kimberley beef, which Mum stored in an upright chest freezer. We had little money, but she would make us ice-cream and icy poles from powdered milk and Milo; bake biscuits, and cook casseroles.

In 2024, I asked my father which of his parishes he had enjoyed most during his sixty-one years as an Anglican priest and he said, 'Kununurra was the most challenging ministry I had, but the most exciting – it would have to be Kununurra.'

My brother's greatest sense of belonging also stems from this time; his early childhood was at Argyle Station where he was cared for by the Peters family after my mother was flown to Perth for management of her twin pregnancy. I stayed with my Dad. I went to bed late and accompanied Dad to town gigs where he played his banjo. Kununurra is where a part of my heart remains. Something about that red dirt.



Today we have nearly 200 active Nomads travelling across rural, regional and remote Australia to provide care and support to our Field Staff and assist at events such as the annual Katherine Christian Convention as well as the Aboriginal Evangelical Family Camp.



As a young clergyman with a wife and two very young children, Jan and I thought we were glued into the parish of Cooma NSW. I was the assistant at St Paul's and the Rector asked if I would welcome the NSW BCA secretary to present an address about the work of the Society.

Jan and I were 'zapped' that night and really believed that God put into our hearts the desire to join the outreach of BCA. We made a 'wobbly' approach to Bill Rich concerning our belief. He told us there was nowhere looking to be backed by BCA. But BCA was soon approached by the Primate who asked if it would consider providing ministry to the top end of WA.

Our lives were to change. In 1965 we were flown to Perth where we collected a long-wheeled Land Rover and organised furniture to be purchased and sent up via coastal shipping. The 2000ml+ road journey offered a sealed road to Carnarvon but after that we faced a rough red dirt road and high temperatures.



On arrival in Kununurra, we learned the news that our house which was supposed to be built was still in bundles on the docks in Perth. Like the Nativity message in the Bible, there was no room at the inn. Seventy plus miles north in Wyndham we could housesit some government homes. There had been a death of a young worker in Wyndham, and the townspeople heard of the clergyman coming, so they adjourned to the pub and waited. Jan and our two little ones were whisked off while I was told to take the funeral. Because we spent guite some time in Wyndham before our Rectory was built, we were able to build a special ministry there, which never would have happened if we had stopped in Kununurra – what a wonderful God!

Over the five years we got to know people in the two towns, the Forrest River Mission, Halls Creek, many cattle stations and road camps as well as the Kimberley Research Station (KRS). After celebrating Holy Communion in a shed at KRS using a bale of hay as a Communion

Table, a Baptism was arranged in the Ord River. A drunk fellow, with beer cans, some empty, but others full, was sitting on the riverbank. As I began, he started rolling beer cans down the stony riverbank.... "What ya doin?' I explained, and later he yelled, "Well my cans can be yer church bells" and then, "what's the croc got to do with it?" I looked behind and saw a croc behind me. That was when I tried to emulate our Lord walking on water.

While in Kununurra our twin daughters were born. They made friends with Karina a little girl their age and the three were often mistaken as triplets. One day we heard car brakes squealing, the crunch of metal and then SILENCE!

Karina had been with her mum, standing on the seat of a Toyota ute with windows open. A second ute came out of nowhere, hit the ute Karina was in, and our third little girl was thrown out and the ute rolled on her. Going to her dad and breaking the news was gutwrenching.

Within the local congregation and far-flung cattle stations, we experienced fellowship. We made friends with God's people and are still in touch with some today. One young scallywag came to know Jesus and was later ordained. He and his wife are still serving our Lord. Their four children are our godchildren. He even conducted the wedding of our eldest daughter, Elizabeth.

All this, because 60+ years ago, the Rector at St Paul's Cooma asked me to conduct the evening service and welcome the NSW BCA Secretary.
