More than likely when you read this article, we will be fast approaching Easter once again. A time of great celebration and yet a time I often find myself saying "I have no words!" (You probably never thought you would hear a preacher say that!)

To explain myself, let me quote some words from a young poet, Isaac Wimberley, who delivers his work in a semi-rap rhythmic style.

If there are words for Him (God) then I don't have them.

See my brain has not yet reached the point where it could form a thought that could adequately describe the greatness of my God.

And my lungs have not yet developed the ability to release a breath with enough agility to breathe out the greatness of His Love.

And my voice, see my voice is so inhibited, restrained by human limits that it's hard to even sing the praise up, you see, if there are words for Him, then I don't have them.

He's unsearchable yet knowable, indefinable yet approachable, indescribable yet personal...

He is beyond comprehension, further than imagination, constant through generations, King of every nation, but if there are words for Him, then I don't have them.

The poem may not be to your liking, but I hope that you may have understood the premise. It is not that we don't have words to describe God – we do have words and lots, masses, numerous, countless, and voluminous numbers of them! Yet how do you describe the indescribable mercy of the invisible and immortal Lord God Almighty?

When you come to Easter Sunday, I challenge you to adequately capture in words the victory and triumph of what occurred when Jesus was resurrected – because if there are words then I don't have them. How can you describe the willing sacrifice on a rugged cross and the conquering defeat of death in the resurrection by the second person of the Trinity, the incarnate Son, the Alpha and the Omega, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, and all for those who were his enemies?

When I try to comprehend it (let alone describe it with words) then in my whole being to the depth of my soul I am overwhelmed, overcome, astounded and speechless.





# Bringing the good news to school kids in the Territory

In January this year Kylie, Matt & Ava Garrett took the long drive from Port Macquarie to Darwin, visiting Coober Pedy on their way (see above). On 23 January, Kylie commenced as the Scripture Union NT Field Development Manager. In this role, she oversees and coordinates the Religious Instruction and Chaplaincy programs, SUPA Clubs and ISCF groups in the Darwin area.

Kylie previously worked at Port Macquarie Public School as a Chaplain two days a week and also as a School Learning Support Officer. In her role as Chaplain, she provided wellbeing support for students, staff and families at the school. She ran friendship groups which taught social and relational skills and also helped deliver a welfare program which included providing breakfast, class fruit tubs and uniform financial support.

"It was a great delight when the school extended my hours out of their own pocket after seeing the changes in the kids I worked with and the benefit to families and the wellbeing of the school," says Kylie. "At the last Generate training day I was also asked to speak in a session on how I've been able to link my church to school ministry and the successes I've had."

Kylie is going to use these skills in her new role in the Territory, "I hope that my contribution to BCA will be through providing an advocating voice for its work and ministry, a prayer support in the field and to make a difference in Darwin. My plan, God-willing, is to bring the good news of Jesus to children in their schools and community."

Please pray for Kylie & Matt who have left behind their daughters Chloe and Macy, son Isaac and son-in-laws Kyle and Cornelius. Pray also for Ava who adjusts to school and life in the Territory. ## First fruits of the FNMT

Since BCA started partnering with the Aboriginal Evangelical Fellowship's First Nations Ministry Training (FNMT) initiative in mid-2022, Principal Dennis Taylor and his wife Valda have been tirelessly working building relationships and forming partnerships.

When we were commissioned to serve with BCA last May I said, I don't know why God has launched us into this new work when I am only one month away from retirement age, but who am I to question God, He knows, and I trust Him to take my wife and I through this next phase of ministry for His good.

The fruit of our ministry was celebrated on 28 September 2022 when ten students completed the first Discipleship 1 program – 'Getting to know God'. The feedback was encouraging, and the group are excited about the next instalment

- the 16-week Discipleship 2 course ('Gifts that can be used to edify the church'). One of the things that excited us most is that one of the students approached his Pastor to see if we can run the course for their church.

We would value your prayers as the FNMT continues to grow. We are looking to run training in remote and isolated areas in WA, in the Kimberleys and have also had some interest from South Australia. Please pray for continued strength for us – the workload has increased, and the task ahead is looming large.

Our God can do immeasurably more than we ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20) and we constantly thank God for all that he is doing in this corner of the country.

I have been working with some of our congregation equipping them to pass on God's word in preaching. In particular two guys are studying God's word by correspondence through Moore and Ridley Colleges; it has been a joy helping them grapple with God's word. It's great to see the fruit of their labour as they encourage and build up the church with their preaching. It's a blessing that God has bought these people to Kununurra, and we thank Him for them.



Australian Historical Author and Forester Robert Onfray recently contacted us after writing a history of BCA on his website. He has also written an article on former BCA pilot John Lindridge. Below is an abridge version of this article.

While finalising a previous blog, I was reminded of the tragic plane crash on Daisy Nolan Hill, near Hampshire, in 1983, which killed the sole occupier, pilot John Lindridge.

I researched what I could about John and quickly discovered he had a remarkable flying career, first as a pilot with a flying medical service in outback South Australia in the 1960s, then part of critical freight and transport in the Bass Strait, to more flying in Tasmania.

In 1955, John left for Australia as a 'ten-pound pom'. He studied at night at the Tasmanian Aero Club to get his commercial pilot licence while doing his day job at the paper mill. It was during this time he met schoolteacher Marie Morse at church, and they married in 1957.

After getting his commercial pilot's licence, John was alerted by his wife to a job with the flying medical service run by the Bush Church Aid

Society (BCA) in South Australia. BCA started in the late 1930s with a single light plane. However, by the early 1960s, the flying services were in strong demand in the vast outback, and BCA purchased a second plane and advertised for a pilot. With a Christian sense of vocation and his newly acquired pilot's licence, John successfully applied for the job in 1961, and he and Marie packed their bags and moved to Ceduna.

Both John and Marie were looking for more in their life at that young age, not that living in a fibro-cement house at Ceduna wasn't challenging and isolated. On the contrary, it was a barren, dry and dusty place. Ten days after arriving there, their first child Gillian was born, and two boys followed with Michael in 1963 and Geoff in 1966. For John, he managed to see the vast outback and experience plenty of adventures within the routine flying visits of doctors and nurses to the outback

towns. For Marie, she had support through BCA, and they became part of the local community, meeting wonderful people, some of whom have remained life-long friends. Marie helped at the hospital and was the Secretary of the School of the Air Mother's Club.

John was required to land in whatever the conditions. In some cases, on the Nullarbor, there were caves under the runway, and potholes would appear after rain. He had an unfortunate incident on the very rough runway at Cook, a railway town halfway between Port Augusta and Kalgoorlie. The nose of the aircraft was damaged after trying to land on an uneven surface (see above).

As a rule, he was required to land before dark to avoid the airport putting on the runway lights and then reporting this to the aviation



authorities. As a result, he earned his nickname 'Last Light Lindridge', as he always managed to land before the last light.

John later acquired his night flying rating, which allowed him to fly at night without a valid medical reason. In addition, it allowed him to bring the doctor home at night after a day's consulting.

Marie recalls one incident when they received a call in the middle of the night from the only residents of an idyllic island off the Eyre Peninsula, near Elliston. A frantic wife found her husband's dinghy washed up on the shore with him missing. He had gone out to check his large boat was still moored securely during the gale force winds. They were the only ones living on the island. John flew out with the Harbour Master and the matron. The frantic wife had to drive the tractor to the end of the runway with its light left on and place lanterns along the runway. After safely landing, the Harbour Master rowed out in the dinghy and found the husband safely on his boat. He was unable to row back to shore because the dinghy had drifted away.

There were many trips to treat sick people and mercy dashes to save lives, such as Aboriginal babies with gastroenteritis, miners falling down opal mineshafts and landing on the Nullarbor for a car accident. One patient was violently sick all over John and the control panels. When John was cleaning the plane afterwards, he found a pair of dentures. On another occasion, John was called out at midnight to take the doctor to Kingoonya, where a man collapsed at a dance. A suspected brain haemorrhage turned out to be a heart attack. They flew the man to Woomera hospital. John and the doctor arrived back at Ceduna at 5am. Needless to say, neither attended the church service that morning.

John was fortunate to work with chief pilot Allan Chadwick, the original and only pilot of the flying service since 1938. Every month was busy for the two pilots covering such enormous areas. A typical month involved transporting up to ten patients to hospitals, racking up nearly 10,000 kilometres of flying.


In early 1967, BCA began assessing the viability of its flying medical service and in 1968 decided to bring down the curtain on its long and eventful service that covered some 130,000 square kilometres based out of Ceduna. The Australia-wide Royal Flying Doctor Service took over their work.



#### **WELCOME**





The archives at the BCA National Office contain nearly 104 years of interesting memorabilia; from the cap worn by Australia's first flying parson Len Daniels, to the radio used at Ceduna. But key to preserving the memories of past faithful servants are the countless recollections and photos from Field Staff. Many years ago, the former Sydney radio station 2CH used to feature BCA on their broadcasts. Here is one extract from a 1986 broadcast...

The driveway at the Bishop Kirkby Memorial Hospital at Cook doubles as a landing strip. There are two four-wheel-drive vehicles, one able to travel on the railway track.

This is South Australia's most remote bush hospital.

Cook has a fixed population of about 80, the town itself a dot on the Nullabor Plains.



On Saturday, the 26th April 1986, its population swelled by almost 50 per cent when the South Australian Minister of Health, Dr Cornwall, flew in for a thanksgiving and dedication service. About 40 well-wishers arrived, some from NSW which included The Revd Brian Roberts and others from Victoria plus a bus load of people arriving from Adelaide and several pick up points along the way. This was organised and accompanied by our BCA South Australian secretary, The Revd Bruce Cliff.

The celebration? Completion of \$200,000 worth of renovations, to supply adequate and proper medical care. A major event for the Cook township, which literally exists to serve the Port Augusta-Perth railway line.

The hospital is recognised as a vital base by people of the Far West. That's why BCA raised \$150,000 towards its updating and the South Australian Health Commission provided the other \$50,000.

Just imagine. Emergency procedure involves reaching patients from small railway towns using the four-wheel-drive vehicle which runs along the track on railway wheels. The nomadic kangaroo shooters and fox hunters or those camped in the area are served by the conventional vehicle.

In emergencies the Royal Flying Doctor service aircraft can taxi right up to the hospital so that patients can be transferred to Adelaide, Port Augusta or Ceduna. From the initial emergency call up until the patient's arrival at a major hospital can take six to seven hours.

Sister Margaret Barnes says, 'isolation isn't the only hardship facing a hospital such as the Bishop Kirkby Memorial Hospital'. In summer, even with some air conditioning, the temperature inside the hospital can reach 50 degree Celsius. To keep patients' temperatures at a safe level, they either had to be immersed in a bath or wrapped in wet cloths.



Another of the mind-numbing effects of the vastness of the plains can have is to instil the fear of open space and your remoteness. Margaret remembers how a Sister who had come out to the hospital to do relief work only lasted one day. The flat, vast, open space called the Nullabor frightened her so much that she just couldn't stay.

Let us thank God for the faithfulness of the staff in the past and praise Him for the work done on the hospital and the ongoing ministry and faithfulness of the present staff.

The Cook Hospital was opened in 1937 as a memorial to BCA's organising missioner SJ Kirkby. It was decommissioned in 1998 when the railway township was scaled down in operations and a local medical service became excess to needs.

### Councillor's Column

It has been, and continues to be, my great privilege to chair the Society, working closely with our current National Director and his two predecessors. For more than 100 years the Society has been constant in its aim to go the distance to bring the gospel to all Australians, particularly those in regional, rural and remote areas. Despite its longevity, the Society has never remained stuck in past ways of achieving the aim. What I find most exciting is that it has always been innovative and pioneering whether that be establishing the first flying medical service in South Australia; providing Field Staff to new towns established in remote areas to service new mines, such as Newman and Roxby Downs; seed funding new forms of ministry or establishing with God-given foresight - digital communication of worship services in readiness for the pandemic.

We will never be perfect this side of heaven, but we continue to strive to undertake all of our activities and processes to the best of our abilities, learning from our mistakes and constantly improving. This applies as much to corporate governance as it does to processes for selection and induction. Throughout the decades prayer has always undergirded everything we do and every new initiative follows prayer and seeking of God's will. Sometimes it can be frustrating when this answer is slow in coming, particularly for the right candidates to fill vacant positions. However, we know from God's word that he is faithful and will answer our prayers in His timing, even if it is not ours.

A recent exciting answer to our prayers involves the Diocese of Bathurst. We agreed with Bishop Mark Calder that we would take on the task of finding and supporting ministers



for the parishes of Cowra, West Wyalong and Cobar in addition to continuing to fund a ministry training placement at Bathurst Cathedral. It is a matter of extreme joy that all four positions have been filled and the four couples were commissioned in January and February this year.

Reaching our First Nations brothers and sisters has always been a part of our mission. However, we have been able to give this area renewed focus with the appointment of The Reverend Neville Naden as a Senior Officer of the Society and with his assistance we have adopted a Biblebased Acknowledgment of Country, a Reconciliation Action Plan and cross-cultural training for the Council as well as Field Staff and Home Staff. Recently Dennis & Valda Taylor have joined as Field Staff to develop theological training pathways for First Nations candidates (see article on Page 9).

2023 will be yet another exciting year for BCA but not without its challenges. I covet your continuing prayers for myself, Greg Harris, the Council and the Executive as we lead the Society, to make the decisions that God wants.
